Just a thought from Judith

Sabbatical is a time to reflect and recuperate from the demands of Church and Circuit life. Others take time to explore a different way of life, find new skills, for Louise she is going to explore Iconography. Unfortunately, we won't be the ones to share in her newfound skills as she journeys across the Pennines to pastures new in September. But we wish her well as she travels on.

Perhaps many of us too would like a Sabbatical and perhaps we just need to be a little bit more inventive about how we to can find time to explore our faith, find new skills and be kind to ourselves. Letter from our Superintendent Revd Stuart Wild

Dear Friends,

There are major changes happening in the circuit as I am sure you are aware. Last year the Blackpool and South Fylde circuits combined to form the not very imaginatively named

Blackpool and South Fylde Circuit. This was a circuit of nine churches staffed by three presbyters, a deacon (half time) and two lay workers (half time). This year Louise Makin has left and Judith Smith will finish in the summer.

You may be aware that there are not the number of ministers available that there used to be and that means that there are far fewer ministers available than circuit appointments seeking ministers.

Unfortunately, our circuit did not secure a probationer and so from September we will be down to two presbyters. There was nothing wrong with the appointment. There were just more appointments than probationers available and we were unlucky. We will try again next year but there are no guarantees and no account will be taken of last year's disappointment.

So next year, in addition to our existing sections, I will take responsibility for The Drive and Rev Andy Halstead will take on responsibility for Church Road. Deacon Kim will look after Freckleton. We will be seeking to recruit three part time lay workers and one of them will be working alongside Andy at Church Road and Wesley's. Initially these appointments will be for a year but...

Well let me quote a worship song

And that is my prayer.

As I sit this afternoon like many of you, I am looking forward to some sunny summer weather. Unfortunately, it is a typical Bank Holiday and we have come back soaked from taking Fimber for his walk. Strangely the sea front around Fairhaven was devoid of people which meant a rather peaceful walk if rather wet.

It's strange how sometimes we crave being with people and at other times we appreciate the peace and quiet around. The tide was coming in, gently lapping, the birds were singing in the rain, and a few honks from the geese letting us know they were there.

We don't read much about the rain in the New Testament, lots about rain in the Old Testament. The story in Matthew Ch 7 v 24-29 about building your house on the sand rather than being founded on rock is a pertinent reminder of flooding. In Mark Ch 4 v 35-41 we read the story of the storm, when the disciples feared for their lives, which Jesus stilled, both point out that Jesus spoke with authority.

I think what we need is the gentle rain approach, just enough to encourage the growth of a seed and be there with the watering can in the warm summer sun if life begins to wilt a little.

New President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference elected for 2023/24

The Methodist Conference has elected the Revd Gill Newton to serve as President and Deacon Kerry Scarlett to serve as Vice-President, starting their year of office when the Representative Session of the Methodist Conference opens in Birmingham in June.



The Revd Gill Newton is a life-long Methodist, raised in Cornwall, with experience of circuit ministry and has served as the Sheffield District Chair since 2014.

Following the announcement of the election results, the Revd Gill Newton said: "I am both humbled and honoured to have been entrusted with this role by the members of the Methodist Conference. With God's help and together with the Vice President Designate, Deacon Kerry Scarlett, I

look forward to the opportunities we will have to encourage, inspire and challenge the Methodist people during our year of office."

Gill Newton chairs the Ministries Committee overseeing the development of the church's ministry in many varied contexts. She also serves on the Strategy and Resources Committee and on the Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes Board and has previously chaired the Ministerial Candidates and Probationers

Oversight Committee and served as Chair of the Chairs.

Deacon Kerry Scarlett, from the Birmingham District, has a passion for justice and seeks to enable and amplify the voices of others. Kerry founded ADAVU, an anti-trafficking charity and participated in regional network and anti-trafficking campaigns.



Speaking following the election, Kerry Scarlett said: "It is an honour and a privilege to have been elected Vice-President Designate. I am very much looking forward to working with Gill Newton, and am very grateful for the opportunity to serve the Methodist Church in this way."

Kerry has served the church in a number of ways including theological education, the Learning Network, a variety of committees including the Candidates Committee and has contributed to and facilitated complex reviews.

The role of President of the Methodist Conference is reserved for presbyters and that of Vice-President for lay people or deacons.

This year, the Methodist Conference will take place in Birmingham, from 22-29 June





LANCASHIRE METHODIST DISTRICT NEWS

Last year, we reported that the Districts in the North West have been working more closely together to share resources in support of mission, training and opportunities. Proposals were being developed for a regional structure, with work divided between three

hubs: a Mission Hub for spiritual leadership, a Service Hub for statutory matters such as property, finance, safeguarding etc and a Ministry Hub for worship and discipleship matters.

At the District Synod in April, representtaives voted in favour of the proposed amalgamation of the Lancashire District with neighbours in Cumbria, Liverpool and Bolton & Rochdale Districts, to become a new North West regional District from September 2024, with new ways of resourcing ourselves for mission. We now look to Methodist Conference at the end of June for final discussions and decisions regarding this proposal.

I have been a Methodist minister for 30 years having previously worked as a self-employed furniture maker. For the last seven years I have been project leader of The Chapel in the Fields, working from a refurbished Chapel in Dunham Massey, near Altrincham in the Manchester & Stockport Methodist District.



This is seen as a pioneering project exploring spirituality, creativity, hospitality and worship. The Chapel now is a resource to local churches and others. We recently enjoyed welcoming the Time Out group from Church Road.

My old skills in woodwork have come in useful as we developed a workshop within the Chapel where, amongst other things, we make quality wooden items for sale, we upcycle old wood where possible and we enjoy a link with the local Social Prescribing team. This partnership has resulted in welcoming folk into the workshop who benefit from social interaction as well as making and creating. This helps improve wellbeing.



We also host and lead Quiet Days; we serve the very local Crematorium with a Hot Drinks ministry and since Lockdown we distribute a weekly digital 'Postcard' to countless numbers of folk. Also, for over three years we have engaged with over thirty folk for a monthly gathering for worship and reflection.

I look forward to being back at Church Road and sharing with you more about The Chapel in the Fields.

VISIT FROM HEYHOUSES SCHOOL PUPILS

On Wednesday 26th April Church Road Methodist opened its doors to 91 Year 4 children from Heyhouses Endowed Church of England Primary school, accompanied by their teachers, teaching assistants and parent helpers. This is a long tradition going back long before Covid 19 put a stop to these sorts of visits and all the staff and children were delighted to return.



The 8- and 9-year-old children have been studying churches as part of their RE learning. They had considered the important features of a church, looked at churches from around the world and read about the formation of the early church. For the Church Road visit the focus was on their observation skills as they had to compare and contrast the features with

those from St Annes Parish Church. The children were already in small groups and primed with things they wanted to look out for, iPads at the ready to take photographs.

TIME OUT UPDATE SUMMER 2023



"Time Out is a faith-based fellowship group for secondary school aged young people, encouraging them to explore their faith, what it means to them, how it relates to their daily lives and those of the local and worldwide community in which they live".

So much has happened and there has been so much to celebrate and be thankful for in our work with the young people since we last wrote in October.



Christmas may seem like a lifetime ago, but we have clear and special verv memories of the teenagers finding, dare we say their "inner child" as thev supported the JKids with their nativity service and prepared Christingles for our annual service over creamy hot chocolate in the Hub. They soon resumed their

usual level of teenage competitiveness as they immersed themselves along with their families in our Time Out Christmas social – the source of this collective competitiveness became clearer once we'd seen the adults in action!

As the new-year rolled in, we shared an evening entitled "Aspirations – What does the Bible Say?" Discussion focused on their hopes and dreams, alongside the challenge of what makes a better Christian and how living this way may help them in their aspirations and the aspirations that God has for their lives.

No chance to rest on their laurels, as the next session quickly followed with a movie night when we watched "An Interview with God", following the journey of a young war journalist on his returning from Afghanistan, readjusting to life in America and questioning "where is God?". Some really open and honest debate arose from the story line and the concept of how and in what way you recognize God if He sat down in front of you and what would you want to ask Him or challenge Him about if He didfood for thought!

In March we had the privilege of sharing in the confirmation service of two of our group members, Iona and James. What a joyful celebration of public witness with a mixture of traditional and contemporary worship music chosen by the young people to express their faith and calling, followed by a time of shared fellowship with their church family. We ask that you continue to support these young people as they continue their journey and explore the potential skills they can share to live out their calling.



Lent was then tackled from a different perspective this year as we explored "Beauty in Brokenness- How God Restores Our Broken Hearts," using the art of Kintsugi. Never have we seen a group of young people both surprised and delighted to be given a hammer **and** permission to officially break healing and restorative power when we open our hearts to Him.

Easter was subsequently a real joy and blessing as seven of our young people

joined us at a day retreat led by Revd Kevin Johnson, and his wife Jane, at The Chapel in the Fields, Dunham Massey, Altrincham. The day was designed to allow the group the time and space to take literal "Time Out" in fellowship together whilst exploring their relationship with God through a mixture of Godly play, creativity and nature.

We weren't disappointed; from our departure from Church Road at 8.30am and safe return at teatime the same day, the group was upheld by the Holy Spirit and God's peace and joy was evident in both in the quiet and the practical activities we shared as we explored "I Am".



From Bible readings and prayer, to challenge and reflection, through woodwork and games, a nature walk and ice cream, toasted marshmallows and the loud song call of the wren, God walked with us.

We are truly grateful for the prayerful support and personal generosity of congregational members that enabled this retreat to be possible. It not only encouraged and upheld the young people on their journey but renewed and refreshed us both as we work alongside them.

Who was Wesley?



- John Wesley was born in Epworth, Lincolnshire in 1703.
- He was brought up as an Angican and studied at Oxford with his brother Charles.
- They and their friends were ridiculed for studying the bible and one of the nicknames they were given was Methodists because of their methodical approach to study and prayer.
- Both brothers were ordained as Anglican priests and in 1735 John and Charles travelled to America as missionaries.
- In 1778 both brothers had profound spiritual experiences that assured their faith.
- John developed a gift as a preacher and travelled the country on horseback to meet the "real people", preaching in the open air, while his brother Charles became a wonderful hymn

writer, writing many of the hymns still sung today.

- The first Methodist Chapel was opened in Bristol and today there are 80 million Methodists worshipping across the world.
- Wesley worked for justice, he visited prisons and worked alongside widows and orphans to bring relief to those most in need and campaigned against slavery until his death in 1791.

Wesleys Café and Larder



- Church Road Methodist Church has a history of service to the local community.
 - The room now used for Wesley's Café was the original Wesleyan Mission Hall, built in 1888 (the date plaque is on the front of the building), and where the kitchen is used to be a stage. The present church was built in 1904/05, when the original Mission Hall became the Sunday School. A large hall and more rooms were added in the late 1950s.
- In the 1970's the Church raised funds to build an extension to the centre to provide much needed Day Care facilities, originally staffed and managed by Church members in association with the local council.
- Over time, changes in the way Social Care is provided meant that the Day Care Centre (by then run by a private company) became financially unviable and was closed at the end of 2013.
- In September 2014 the space left by the Day Care Centre was offered to the Trussell Trust to operate a Food Bank, and this continued until December 2017 when the redevelopment of the premises meant they had to find a new home at the United Reformed Church in St Annes.
- A new mission for the Church began in 2016 thanks to an initiative from Paul Caddy to engage with the Church in a 'Cooking on a Budget' project. The aim of the project was to teach people to cook healthy meals whatever their budget, and to develop a community café providing meals for visitors to the food bank and the local community. This was the start of Wesley's café.
- Removal of the Church pews in 2013 had created a flexible area for worship and other activities, and in April 2017 the Church Council approved the sale of half of the Church premises to create space for affordable housing and a new Community Hub.
- The redevelopment was funded through the property sale, various grants and donations, and the generosity of Church members supporting the efforts of an enthusiastic and effective fund raising team.

- Wesley's closed temporarily after Christmas 2017 in preparation for the demolition and re-development of the centre, and reopened in the spring of 2019.
- On 1st June 2019 Church Road Methodist Community Hub was officially opened and the Minister's vestry was refurbished later in 2019 to provide a base for Wesley's larder.
- In 2023 Church Road Methodist Church continues to seek grants and fundraise to support the project and to purchase new equipment for the community such as the defibrillator. We also provide practical support and pastoral care working, alongside the dedicated and skilled group of volunteers from across the whole community of St Annes.
- The Community Hub continues to thrive, providing a safe space for Wesley's café and larder, iHope, Brownies, JKids, Movement to Music, and various Council funded and other activities.

USING THE COMMUNITY DEFIBRILLATOR



Firstly, thanks again to everyone who helped to raise the funds to buy the defibrillator. I've been asked since by several people "how do I use it?" Hopefully the below helps to explain this. I can also recommend the British Heart Foundation, who also have some excellent online videos which you can watch.

A defibrillator is a device that gives a high energy electric shock to the heart of someone who is in cardiac arrest. This high energy shock is called defibrillation, and it's an essential part in trying to save the life of someone who's in cardiac arrest. A defibrillator may also be called a defib, an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) or a PAD (Public Access Defibrillator).

To use the defibrillator, follow these simple steps:

Step 1: Turn the defibrillator on by pressing the button and follow its instructions.

Step 2: Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the patient's skin, one on each side of the chest, as shown in the picture on the defibrillator.

Step 3: Once the pads have been attached, stop CPR and don't touch the patient. The defibrillator will then check the patient's heart rhythm.

Step 4: The defibrillator will decide whether a shock is needed and if so, it will tell you to press the shock button. An automatic defibrillator will shock the patient without prompt. Don't touch the patient while they are being shocked.

Step 5: The defibrillator will tell you when the shock has been delivered and whether you need to continue CPR.

Step 6: Continue with chest compressions until the patient shows signs of life or the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heartbeat again.

Anyone can use a defibrillator and you don't need training. Once you turn it on, it will give clear instructions on how to attach the defibrillator pads. The device checks the heart rhythm and will only tell you to shock if it's needed. You can't shock someone accidentally.
